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



Gaining Perspective: Listening to Kinship Caregivers and Grandfamilies



The importance of understanding perspective

Understanding other perspectives can help educators:

- Clarify needs that should be addressed
- Identify underlying issues
- Prioritize areas for improvement

Fireside chat: Reflection

- Content: What did you learn from listening to the conversation?
- Method: What did you notice about how the conversation was conducted?





Pulling back the curtain: Empathy interviews



1. Plan



2. Listen



3. Take action

Plan: Determine purpose and create a list of questions



- What do you want to know and what will you do with what you learn?
- Your list of questions should:
 - Begin with an explanation of why the questions are important and how the information will be used.
 - Use inclusive language and avoid jargon.
 - Design questions that ask for stories, not solutions or a list of issues.
 - Use an asset-based mindset, acknowledging skills and expertise the interviewee likely possesses.
 - Avoid assumptions.

Sample interview plan




Interview purpose: Broaden our perspective about kinship caregivers' and grandfamilies' lived experiences to better understand how schools can support their children.

- Please help us understand a bit more about you or your child(ren).
 - How many children are you caring for?
 - What are their ages?
 - How long have they been with you?
 - How do they feel about school?
- What have schools done that worked for you?
 - What types of communications have worked?
 - What did they do to make you feel involved and engaged?
 - How have they helped you to help the child or children you are caring for?
 - What information was helpful?
- If there were no limits, what would you wish schools would do?
 - How could schools better help you to support the child or children you are caring for?



Listen with empathy





- Pay attention to how the interviewee is feeling and responding.
- Be careful not to imply that a question has a right or wrong answer.
- Be aware of implicit biases and be sure to treat the interviewee with respect and an open mind.

- What should I continue doing?


